# Home With ... Bob Jensen

One suggestion to our readers:
Despite his lack of square pants
(well, at least to my knowledge),
you should ask Bob why some of us
tend to refer him as "SpongÉ".

Bob grew up in Cranford, NJ but was born in nearby Elizabeth — which is deep in the heart of "Sopranos" territory. As a kid, he mostly hung out with his buddies, "played guns" (are we still talking about the Sopranos here?) and he

was an Eagle scout. Bob also played clarinet for years although says he played better in sixth grade than he did in high school.



Bob attended a private high school in Jersey, the Pingry School. In his Freshman year Bob got the most improved student award. After his wild success at Pingry, Bob moved on to Dartmouth College where he was a chemistry major. He attended Dartmouth along with one of his buddies since kindergarten.

A direct commission in the Navy allowed him to attend law school

at Yale. He did this in part to avoid the draft during the Vietnam War. In 1969 he became "Ensign Jensen" (I guess if he had gone into the

Army he might have been "Sergeant SpongÉ" instead). He served in the Navy as a Judge Advocate General (JAG) and spent time at both the Navy Yard and Bethesda Naval Hospital. Bob was eventually sent to the Pentagon and became a line officer.

After leaving the Navy, Bob went to work for a small law firm in DC. He wanted to work there in part because one of the job requirements was that "a sense of humor is required". Unfortunately, that firm went belly-up in the 1980's, leaving Bob with no source of income for a year and a half (so I quess a sense of humor was actually required for the job). He then went to work at a larger law firm (the DC office of a big Chicago firm) where he practiced business law. During that time, he worked with many potential start-ups that couldn't quite make the move from concept to reality, and he subsequently became known as "Dr. No". He wasn't crazy about the legal work itself, but like most of us he needed the money.

Bob met his wife Joanie at the Spanish Ballroom in Glen Echo back in 2000. They waltzed. He saw her at the Ballroom again two weeks later and took the risk of asking her to take a hike with him -- she said YES. They married in 2003 and Bob & Joanie lived in Bethesda until they moved to the Eastern Shore in 2008. Their

move to the "good side" of the Bay Bridge was prompted by a desire for a more relaxed lifestyle, less traffic and proximity to water. Bob recalls seeing Joanie walking back from the dock at the house they ended up buying over here. The glow on her face was all he needed to see.

What does Bob like to do for fun? Play poker and computer games, study philosophy, kayak and fish. He and Joanie also love cruises around various parts of the world (next up: the fjords of Scandinavia). Did I mention earlier that one of Bob's goals in his younger days was to sail around the world?

What does Bob like about QA@H? The people, good intentions, SNAP topics, and the idea of educating contemporaries. He is a bit of a techie, so he is willing to help other QA@H members with their computer woes. Bob also will be coordinating the first "Ready or Not" sessions when they start up this the fall.
